Course Objectives

1 - This is course is meant to acquaint the students of the fourth level to comprehensive reading analysis and discussion. the course is to make students read between the lines, they also should discover and know the hidden meanings of the writer. Course Contents

- 1 This course aims at providing the students with a background on the late Victorian novel which is considered to be the germs of the modern novel, and then will present samples from the of the modern novel in their diversity. Texts for study and analysis will be selected from the works of Henry James and Joseph Conrad, E. M. Forster, D. H. Lawrence, Virginia Woolf, James Joyce George Orwell, Graham Greene, William Golding, and may be others.
- 2 As usual, teaching literature depends much on theoretical system. The lecturer divides the course into sixteen academic weeks, where the chapters of each novel will be covered in a particular time, the period should be stretched to include at least twelve or thirteen weeks where two weeks are given to the mid-term exam and to the final. Teaching methods, no doubt, is theoretical and in the class too, where discussions, analysis and the change of ideas and views are for sure included.
