Course Objectives

- 1 By the end of this course, students are expected to:
- 2 recall speech sounds and their productions and realize the cardinal vowels
- 3 realize some distinctive features of consonants and vowels
- 4 get familiar with some phonological processes e.g. assimilation, deletion, dissimilation, fricative devoicing, apocope, syncope, epenthesis, prosthesis, metathesis, mutation
- 5 realize the word accent and phoneme sequences and consonant clusters in English
- 6 realize the Stress: simple words, nature, levels, within the words, types, placement, complex words
- 7 realize the Syllable and syllabification : structure, tree diagram, syllabic words, types
- 8 realize various accents of English and the sounds of English vowels, diphthongs, triphthongs
- 9 get familiar with the weak forms and intonation : tune shapes, form and function
- 10 be able to transcripe throuhgout the course

Intended Learning Outcomes

Knowledge and Understanding	 The students are expected to be aware of some phonological concepts and processes
Intellectual Skills	 The students are expected to be able to deal with English as native speakers and use it cleverly, and tell which sounds are appropriate or not

Course Contents

This course is considered as an account of some concepts of phonetics and phonology. It provides a sufficient background in English phonetics and phonology to facilitate the students appreciation of some principles. Furthermore, it explains some important phenomena of English segmental and supra-segmental phonology in details.
